

**Czesław Lang has been appointed Attaché to the Polish Olympic team for the Milano Cortina 2026 Olympic Winter Games**

*This marks his return to the Olympic stage, where he will support Polish athletes and celebrate the universal values of sport and friendship once again.*

Warsaw, 7 November 2025 - Represented by its president, **Radosław Piesiewicz, the Polish Olympic Committee** has appointed **Czesław Lang**, General Director of the Tour de Pologne and Olympic silver medallist at the 1980 Moscow Games, as **Attaché of the Polish Olympic team for the Milano Cortina 2026 Olympic Winter Games**, which will take place from 6 to 22 February 2026.

The role of Olympic attaché has a significant practical element: it involves representing, coordinating and supporting the entire delegation, and requires experience, vision and strong interpersonal skills. Through this appointment, the Polish Olympic Committee recognises not only Czesław Lang's outstanding sporting career, but also his deep understanding of international dynamics and the network of relationships he has built over decades, as well as his tireless commitment to promoting Poland's image and values worldwide.

*"I would like to thank President Piesiewicz and the entire Olympic family sincerely for this opportunity," said **Czesław Lang**. "Milano Cortina will be my third Olympic Games: I competed as an athlete in Montreal and Moscow, and now I will experience this event in a new role as attaché. I will do my utmost to meet expectations and represent Poland with pride. The Games will take place in Italy, my second homeland. The Trentino region has been our partner for many years in organising the Tour de Pologne. I know the local authorities, the people and the Italian sports community very well. I am happiest knowing that I will be close to our athletes, ready to offer advice and encouragement and share my experience with them."*

Czesław Lang, a true icon of Polish sport and Olympic and World Championship silver medallist, was the first Polish professional cyclist to compete with Italian teams for many years. Fluent in Italian and deeply familiar with the country, he has built a solid network of contacts in the sporting world – qualities that make him the ideal figure for this prestigious role. After ending his competitive career, he founded and developed the Tour de Pologne, transforming it into a world-class event of great international prestige. Under his leadership, the race has grown to become one of the most important cycling events in the world and a fixture on the UCI WorldTour calendar.

Italy, the host nation of the upcoming Winter Games, also holds a special place in Lang's personal history and that of the Tour de Pologne. In 2013, the race began in the Trentino region under the motto 'From Italian soil to Poland', symbolically linking the two countries through their shared passion for cycling and sport.

The connection between the Tour de Pologne and the Olympic spirit extends beyond Lang himself. In 2014, Zbigniew Bródka, the Olympic speed skating champion from the Sochi Games, participated in the amateur edition of the Tour de Pologne. This is a vivid example of how sport can transcend barriers, unite disciplines and bring together seemingly distant worlds. Moments like this capture the universal power of the Olympic values of passion, dedication, respect and friendship, which the Tour de Pologne continues to embody and promote each year. In doing so, it serves as a symbolic bridge between the Summer and Winter Games, generations of athletes and nations, all of which are united by the inexhaustible energy of sport.
